Why do we worship?

This isn't a test. This isn't a joke. I'm honestly curious: why do <u>you</u> think we gather for worship?

Recently a friend of mine accepted a new call closer to their hometown. Until now, they've served a wealthy congregation in a decently-sized suburb several states away. I actually worshiped at that site once, and was struck by the blatant words of the senior pastor's sermon: "We gather for worship knowing that God will bless us with good things in return for our praise!" The whole message of the day centered on how God would bring prosperity to the people in exchange for their devotion. Is that why we worship?

Another friend—a first generation immigrant to this country—once told me that their congregation worships in a boisterous manner "because worship is our chance to forget the hardness of life." Is that why we worship?

I have friends who complain about how their parents "made" them go to worship as a kid, and that that is their excuse for not going as an adult. "I did my time: I earned my checkmark," is the unspoken attitude. Is that why we worship?

I have friends who attend a church whose theology they disagree with, but they have other friends who attend and this is an easy way to stay in touch. Is that why we worship?

I cannot speak for everyone, but if I take a moment to ponder my own reasons for worship they boil down to something simple: for me, worship is a chance to tap into something bigger, more powerful, and more lasting than myself. Worship is a chance to celebrate God's love poured out in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Worship is a chance to ponder life's meaning and how I can help people live lives of purpose. I don't worship to forget. I don't worship in order to appease or bribe or change God. I worship in order that God might change me.



Bethel Lutheran Church May 4 - 5:00 PM



A Lifelong Learner by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop

So faith comes from what is heard, and what is heard comes by the preaching of Christ. - Romans 10:17

It was a joy for me to be able to share in midweek

worship with the gracious people of Gethsemane and The Garden in Seattle. Dinner consisted of a hearty bowl of chili and bread that was enjoyed by those of us seated at round tables.

Pr. Joanne Engquist was our guide as she helped us explore the depth of God's love for the world. She helped us move beyond the understanding that the creation is simply a back drop for our daily lives or something to be exploited for our own use. We explored together God's desire to redeem not just human lives but the whole creation.

Pr. Enguist masterfully introduced us to a variety of scriptural passages which helped us to see how reconciliation is not something that happens just between human beings. She graciously pointed out the tendency to reduce salvation as an act directed only at individuals and opened for us the expansive desire of God to reconcile all people unto God's self. Then she took us yet one step further as she taught us that the word for world in "God so loved the world" is cosmos. We were now exploring the cosmic dimensions of God's love.

Ceil Fjellman was seated at our table. Ceil was married to the late Bishop Gib Fjellman. Gib was my bishop when I first came into ministry. The Fjellmans have contributed immensely in shaping a deep love of the church for Kim and me. We hold them both as dear friends.

Ceil is very likely to see 100 years of age. This is due in no small part to the way she continues to seek out opportunities for worship and learning. I was so inspired to see Ceil participating fully in the conversation. She resonated with the notion that God loves the whole world. Ceil was articulate in her delight that God's love reaches far beyond the Christian community. I marveled at her openness and her willingness to expand her understanding of God and the whole creation.

The journey through God's love of the cosmos was coming to an end as we were about to move into the chapel for Holden Vespers. Ceil was still ruminating on the evening's word when she shared with us how her understanding of the creation had deepened through the conversation. "I have always thought of the creation as something beautiful that I have enjoyed but now I see that it is even more than that."

Sitting in my chair I could not help but think how amazing it was to watch a person who has lived so many years still enamored with God's word and willing to take in new understanding about the length and depth of God's love. Oh, that we might all be so open and willing to learn.

NW Washington Synod of the ELCA -- 2014 Synod Assembly -- May 16 & 17 Edward D. Hansen Conference Center, Comcast Arena, Everett

It is the annual gathering of members from the congregations, new mission starts and ministry partners from around the NWWA Synod. Additionally, we will hear various reports, vote on a Synod Budget, and consider resolutions that come before the Assembly.
