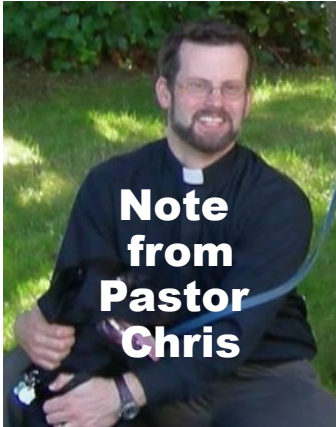

One of the special honors of the pastoral calling is being invited to sit with people who are grieving a loved one. Whatever the details of the loss, the power of the moment never lessens. It is a time of honest, raw emotion – a time where the peace and presence of God is invaluable.

In the rhythm of the church year, All Saints' Day is a time we specifically set aside to open ourselves to both acknowledging that loss as well as reaching out for God's consolation.

I don't know about you, but for me it's nearly impossible to think of All Saints' Day without "For All the Saints" playing in my head. Much like "Lift High the Cross" and Easter, or "Silent Night" and Christmas Eve, the hymn and the sentiment of the day go hand-in-hand. It's a lengthy hymn: there are 11 verses, though we seldom use more than four or five at a time, and only seven are commonly printed in hymnals.

Looking at the "missing" verses, I think I understand why they fell out of favor – at least in Protestant circles (like Lutheranism). Each of the missing verses commemorates a specific group of "official," canonized saints – people like the Apostles, the Evangelists, and various Martyrs. In Roman Catholicism, All Saints' Day is officially intended for the honoring of canonical saints such as those: i.e. people like St. Peter, St. George, and St. Margaret – and those "extra" verses hint at such an understanding of sainthood. In Protestant circles, however, we teach that ALL Christians are saints, because we define a "saint" as someone redeemed by God through grace, not by our own merit. That is why on All Saints' Day Protestants recognize ALL who have gone before – not only those individuals who have been granted feast days.

**This year, All Saints' Day will be observed on Sunday, November 6. As a special part of worship, you are invited to bring a photograph (or photographs) of loved ones you'd especially like to remember and celebrate on this holy day, and we will recognize them during the service.**

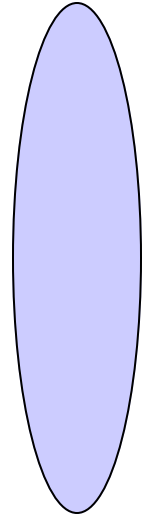

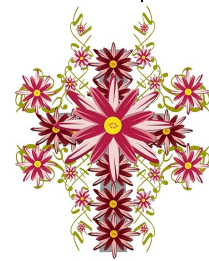

**DUST OFF YOUR FIBER ART SKILLS** because you can prepare for the Tenth Triennial Gathering in any number of ways: knitting, sewing, crocheting and more. None of the activities require that you attend the gathering, so they are a great way to participate without leaving home.

Quilters should consider entering the **black & white + one** quilt challenge. Using only black and white fabrics, plus the addition of one color, make a quilt that's 40 inches square with the purpose of interpreting the gathering theme, All Anew.

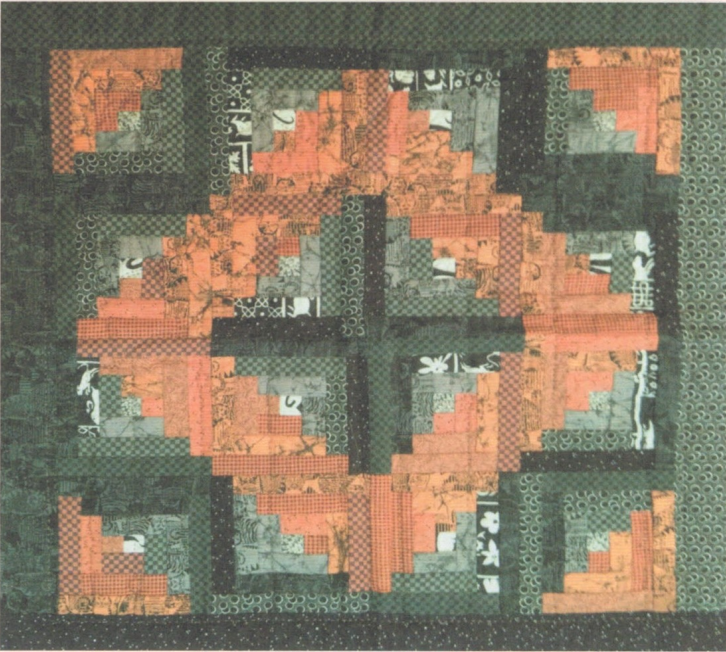
Complete details are available in a downloadable fact sheet at [welcatg.org](http://welcatg.org). Challenge quilts are due in to Women of the ELCA by May 17, 2017, with a completed application form and check for \$10.

Whatever your fiber art of choice, you can make a finger labyrinth...or three or five or 10! We hope to collect 5,000 finger labyrinths. Every voting member at the Tenth Triennial Convention (2017) will receive one as will every participant at the gathering. The remaining finger labyrinths will be given to chaplains in schools, hospitals, hospices and nursing homes.

Labyrinths appear in many traditions and cultures, in many religions and philosophies, throughout human history. Christians most often use a labyrinth in prayer or as a contemplative exercise.

We've provided patterns for quilted (sewn) labyrinths as well as knitted and crocheted labyrinths. Crafty women could use the patterns to create an embroidered or felted labyrinth.

While the challenge quilts are to be the work of one person, making labyrinths can be done in community. Set up a work day, bring your sewing machines and knitting needles, bring a dish to pass, and you've got a great day planned. Add in one or more of our coloring devotionals (there are five altogether), and the day is complete.



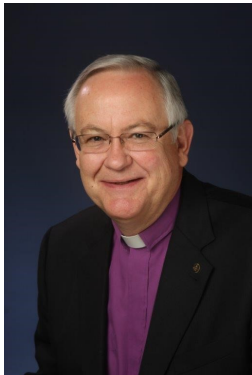

## The Spirit's Gift of Imagination

**K**im has been taking care of kids in our home for over three decades. Every day she plans some form of art project, science experiment, or puzzle that requires solving. It is a joy to see these children light up and dive into the challenge of the day.

Kim is a wonder at being able to set them free to enter into the experience while at the same time offering them the necessary encouragement or just the right question if they start to feel defeated. Teaching children to trust their imagination and to follow their own wonder enriches their sense of life and value.

I have always believed that one of the gifts that comes from being created in the image of the creator is to be blessed with imagination. It takes imagination to navigate life. It takes wonder to venture off in new directions.

There are a zillion examples of how imagination is at work. One fine example that I marvel at is the new Evergreen Point Bridge. I have been equally amazed at how it has been staged and built as I have been by the demolition of the old bridge. How in the world can someone figure out how to do either of these tasks?

Kim's father was the chief engineer for Boeing on the Apollo project. I loved to hear him tell stories of how they put a man on the moon without knowing how to do it. They literally were figuring it out as they went.

I love when I see the handiwork of another and can stand back and say, "Now isn't that clever" or "Why didn't I think of that."

Kim loves to use her imagination in preparing a meal and presenting it for consumption. She puts a lot of thought and care into how the table is set, how the food is arranged on the table, right down to what place settings and serving pitchers to use.

There is something that happens when we become a recipient of another person's imagination and care. It adds a measure of life to our person. While serving the office of bishop, I have become keenly aware of how important the roles of imagination and care are with respect to the vitality of our churches and leaders. Churches, regardless of size, experience vitality when they invite imagination from their members and put a level of care into all that they do. This contrasts sharply with doing what we have always done and not varying from it. Leaders who lose their sense of imagination often lose a sense of hope.

I am convinced that imagination is the work of the Holy Spirit - breathing new life into all that we do.

The author of Ephesians says it well:  
**"Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine."**  
(Ephesians 3:20)

My prayer for you - and the whole church - is for the Holy Spirit to stir deeply our imaginations that we might invest great care into the challenges and opportunities we face. -- BKU

# COMMUNITY HOUSING TO HELP THE HOMELESS AND LOW INCOME

## Compass Crossing Pilot Project



**THE COMPASS CROSSING PILOT PROJECT** is an innovative housing development at the corner of Angeline and 39th Streets in the Columbia

City neighborhood of Seattle. The housing development will be located on property owned by Compass Housing Alliance and currently leased by the Columbia City Church of Hope. Compass Crossing's steel-frame modular housing development will feature 13 housing units including six double occupancy rooms at 240 square feet and seven single occupancy rooms at 160 square feet. The development will feature a multi-purpose community room and kitchen, garden space, and on-site clinical and case management professionals and property management. Compass Crossing will be pet-friendly, contain individualized storage, and provide options for partners to be housed together.

We are excited to share **The Paul G. Allen Foundation has awarded Compass Housing Alliance \$1 million** in support of the Compass Crossing Pilot Project. Allen is responding to the homeless crisis in part by partnering with and providing \$1 million to the Compass Housing Alliance. Compass Housing Alliance provides responsive, essential services and affordable housing for homeless and low-income individuals at over 27 locations in the Puget Sound region. What makes this project unique is the introduction of steel modular pod units, which are easily transported and installed with minimal site preparation and expense. This type of project helps alleviate the time constraint of building affordable low-income housing, while providing a structurally stable, safe and secure alternative to living on the streets or in tent cities.

Maybe, I will survive enough cold, nasty looks and loneliness, Strength and faith will return enough for a new beginning. Maybe one day even a warm loving embrace that is real. I dream of standing on top of the bridge waving and watching This way of life float away, down the river, one day, some day.
