Trained staff at the shelter encourage guests to consider next steps toward housing. The Winter Shelter provides housing case management, hot meals, bus tickets to access facilities and services at God's Li'l Acre day center in Lake City.

King County and the Cities of Seattle, Shoreline, Bothell, Kenmore, as well as private foundations and donors, all contribute funding to this effort. Over 600 community volunteers help make this program a success.

Get to Know Bethel Members: Linda Mears

I was born Linda Marie Johnson to parents of Norwegian and Swedish extraction in then Scandinavian Ballard, where I attended Whittier Elementary, James Monroe Jr. High, and Ballard High School. I attended, was baptized, and confirmed at Our Redeemer's Lutheran. In 1957, I married my husband, Jeff Brady, and got my first job, in the accounting department of PEMCO Insurance. Jeff and I had four children, Michal in 1958, Mark in 1960, Kathy in 1961, and Kim in 1965. The doctor that delivered me also delivered my children. Our children were confirmed at Prince of Peace Lutheran. I was a stay-at-home mom until my children were in junior high school. I then started working part-time at a small computer software company where my husband also worked. After several years we went to work at different companies but always in data processing. In 1978 my husband and a co-worker started their own software company. We bought out the co-worker after a few years and Jeff and I worked together for nearly 30 years at our company. I was the office manager and bookkeeper. Our sons both worked for us until Michael contracted leukemia and passed in 1998. Mark now runs the company. Jeff and I were married just four months short of fifty years when he passed in 2007.

We were "church shopping" when Michael was diagnosed. At the invitation of a friend of our daughter and the kindness of the pastor, we began attending Wooden Cross Lutheran in Woodinville. We were very active there. I served on several regular committees, served two separate, three year terms on Council, was on two different call committees, and accompanied the youth on

Habitat for Humanity projects in Yakima for ten summers. Until I left Wooden Cross last year I was the recorder, recording all pledges and contributions and sending out semi-annual statements to members.

Jeff and I traveled extensively after our children left home and, when I remarried in 2008, to Ray Mears, (who was the first person I ever dated) we continued to travel until Ray was diagnosed with Lewy Body Dementia, which took his life in March, 2017. I have traveled to 83 countries, on six continents, been on safari twice and seen countless amazing places.

I have lived in Lake Forest Park for the past 50 years. I now have three children, seven grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. In addition to family and church, I have many other interests and pastimes. I am a philatelist (stamp collector), and an avid reader (mostly mysteries). I love playing Trivia and word and card games, crosswords puzzles, knitting, bowling, gardening, entertaining, decorating and socializing. I enjoy live theatre, particularly Broadway musicals and the symphony Pops Concerts, but travel is still my favorite thing to do. I also enjoy spending quiet time at my vacation home at Lake Whatcom.

I consider myself exceedingly blessed. While I have not been spared grief, my joys have far exceeded my sorrows. I pray for wisdom to discern what is right and courage to do what is right, and I thank God every day for all of my blessings. I have felt welcomed and at home at Bethel and hope to be here for many years.

God knows how to disarm the world

Friends, we are living in some disturbing times where violence, bullying, threats and hostility abound. The world can be downright mean. No one is

spared - not even mothers and children.

How is one to respond in times like these? Do you just duck and seek cover? Do you remain silent? Do confront those who are the source?

What many have chosen to do is to up their security systems. It is one of America's fastest growing industries. Others choose to literally arm themselves. While still others practice what is called situational awareness. It is about being alert to your surroundings and trying to take the necessary precautions.

On a recent trip to Chicago I heard a wonderful story from one of our Lutheran Bishops about Munib Younan, Bishop Emeritus of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land. (He served as bishop from January 1998 to January 2018.)

My colleague was traveling with Munib when they crossed through a Check Point between Palestine and Israel. They were met by a security guard armed with an assault rifle who was anything but kind to Munib requiring him to get out of the car before he could proceed.

What Munib did is unimaginable to me. During the interrogation Munib said to the guard, "I don't think you like your job." Obviously, this comment took the guard by surprise. It didn't stop Munib. He asked the guard about his family

and discovered he had a girlfriend. Munib increased the level of empathy for the guard's difficult position. Before long the guard put down his assault rifle and wanted to know who this man was.

Munib Younan is one of the most disarming people you will ever meet. He feels so deeply that he has been freed in Christ that he experiences very little fear in what for many is a very frightening place in the world. Everywhere he travels, Munib engages people with this same disarming charm - confronting hostility by revealing the fear that lies behind it.

When I grow up I want to be like him.

We are entering the Advent Season and Christmas. It is a time when we prepare ourselves to worship the Prince of Peace who was born in the same land as Munib. How brilliant of God to enter the world as a baby.

I know of no power greater than that of newborn. A newborn can quickly take over an entire household. They have the power to make macho men break into tears. They attract admiring looks wherever they go, unleashing a power of endearment that is hard to resist.

Yes, our God knows how to disarm the world. This God baby grew up teaching others to turn the other cheek. This baby who became an adult stood up to the likes of Herod and Pilate without batting an eye.

Yes, this Jesus, the Prince of Peace, has come into the world to disarm it. To disarm the hostility and meanness. To create a world where the stranger is welcomed, and all are accepted. This Jesus has come to face the fear of the world and replace it with peace.

Might this Season indeed be a season where each day we pray more fervently: Come Lord Jesus!





Dear members of the NW Washington Synod:

On behalf of the Bishop Nomination and Election Task Force, I send greetings and invite you into the process by which the Northwest Washington Synod will nominate and elect a new bishop in 2019. Accompanying this email is a copy of the Process for Nominating and Electing a Bishop. (This document is also available on the synod's website at this link: www.lutheransnw.org/bishopelection Paper copies are also available from the Synod Office upon request [and in our office at Bethel].) Please help us distribute this document widely by publicizing it in congregational bulletins and newsletters.

Before providing you with a brief overview of the process and key deadlines, let me emphasize the most important point! Nominating and electing a synod bishop are not only legal processes, they are a call process! At every step, we will call upon the Holy Spirit to accompany us on this journey and infuse and bless our work together to identify a leader for the Northwest Washington Synod for the next six years. And, it is important to remember that the nomination and election processes necessarily involve all the congregations and members of our synod!

As the <u>Process for Nominating and Electing a</u> <u>Bishop</u> describes, the *Constitution and Bylaws of the Northwest Washington Synod* and the actions of the Synod Council provide for a nomination period, followed by a period of reflection and discernment, and then the election at the Synod Assembly, which will take place at the Lynnwood Convention Center on May 17-19, 2019.

The nomination period will be from January 1, 2019 until February 16, 2019. Any member of a congregation in this synod may nominate one

person, and anyone on the roster of ministers of Word and Sacrament in the ELCA is eligible to be nominated. (Nomination forms will be available at the link above, and paper copies will be available in the synod office beginning in mid-December.) All nominations will be submitted electronically or in writing to the Chairperson of the Bishop Nomination and Election Task Force, at the address contained in the enclosed document.

Nominees who do not desire to continue in the process will have an opportunity to withdraw prior to the end of February. In mid-March, the list of nominees and biographical and other information will be made available. Between that time and the assembly, forums will be held, and information will be made available. We also anticipate that brief video presentations will be made of each nominee. At the Synod Assembly itself, there will be presentations by nominees before the second ballot and a question-and-answer period thereafter.

In anticipation of the nomination and election of a new bishop, the synod, with the assistance of the ELCA Planning, Research and Evaluation teampart of the Office of the Presiding Bishop -- is conducting a synod-specific survey. All rostered ministers and congregational members are invited and encouraged to respond. The survey is available at this link: https://www.research.net/r/NWWashingtonSBE. Please participate and provide the invitation to participate to every member of every congregation in our synod.

Please see the enclosed document for additional important information regarding the nomination and election processes. Here is a brief summary of key dates:

November 15: Process for Nominating and Electing a Bishop distributed; survey available

January 1, 2019: Nomination period for bishop opens

February 16: Nomination period closes/survey period ends

February 28: Deadline for nominees to withdraw **continued on page 9**

Continued:

March 15: Nominees disclosed; information regarding nominees and survey results distributed; period of prayerful discernment begins

TBD: Nominee forums held May 17-19: Synod Assembly; bishop election conducted

As we journey together in the nomination and election processes, let us always seek God's guidance in discerning the future of the Northwest Washington Synod.
