We are going to hear readings and songs in different languages and I promise you that you will understand them all (thank God for the gift of technology!).

Lastly, we are going to go green in our worship. We have done quite well in conversing our nature by using less paper during Easter season. We will continue this practice throughout the time after Pentecost. If you need large print bulletins, please let know.

the last year and my hope
for the next year would

letter.

I arrived at Bethel last June. When I began the newsletter was being published every one or two months, there was one afternoon bible study, and the beginnings of a lunch on Wednesday, and of course worship Sunday mornings. Not long after Pastor Chris left, the afternoon bible study ended and the lunch on Wednesday began to include a devotional. While I enjoyed participating in lunch and leading an occasional devotional, I was itching to work on more community projects especially ones involving youth. I'm happy to say we began Bethel's after school drop in program in October. With the help of several high school volunteers we were able to provide after school care to one sweet boy for over 60 hours over the course of this last school year. Our high school volunteers gave over 800 combined hours of their time to Bethel watching, playing, and helping with our elementary schooler. 800 hours! That's amazing! Not to mention the many hours put in by our adult volunteers especially Carol Hovick. I so appreciated all of your thoughts, prayers, questions, and ideas regarding our after school program, and I hope it is a project we will be able to continue in the future.

As part of the after-school program I was able to write a much needed children and youth policy to help keep the kids visiting our church safe and set us up to keep any kids joining us in the future safe as well. This policy was approved by the council

who were kind enough to allow me to participate in every council meeting which occur once a month.

When I wasn't working on our after school program I could usually be found in the office prepping the bulletin or powerpoint for Sunday worship, working on the Newsletter, or greeting folkx who visit our building. It has been a good, long, fulfilling year and now it is time to look to the future.

As previously stated I'm hoping to continue with our after-school program but before that can begin we have to get through the summer. There are several community events to look forward to. I hope Bethel will once again participate in the Ridgecrest ice cream social which will take place in the evening on Thursday, August 15th, and Bethel will once again be a venue for the Northcity Jazz Walk on Tuesday, August 13th. I'm also hoping to step up my newsletter game. I've never written a newsletter before but now that I'm in the routine I'm planning to add some more material. In the past, new members have provided a brief biography to help others get to know them. Over the next year I want to provide the same opportunity to the growing community in Shoreline. I hope to meet with several organizations and businesses in Shoreline and hear about who they are and what they do and then share that information with all of you! #### Life In Between

By Bishop Kirby Unti From the Jun 2019 edition of The Spirit On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria

entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" --Luke 10:11-13

Our Synod Staff has been dwelling on Luke's story of the 10 lepers for the last several months. It has come to our attention that the story takes place where many, many Biblical Stories take place, "in between places." In this case Jesus encounters the lepers in between Samaria and Galilee.

There is a practical reason for this. The lepers would not have been welcomed in Samaria or Galilee. They were living in the only place they were allowed, on the margins. Given that Jesus was constantly on the move plays right into the likelihood that we will encounter him in between place.

But there is more to this than geography. The story of faith, hope and love is forged "in between." For Abraham and Sarah it was formed in between the invitation to leave behind family and home and the promise of becoming a great nation. For the Israelites it was in the wilderness between Egypt and Promised Land. For the people of exile it was between living in a strange land and the hope of

returning home. For the disciples it was in between the sea of Galilee and the cross. And then there is the most holy of time between Good Friday and Easter Morning.

I have never been good at living "in between." The uncertainty creates anxiety for me. I want to know the outcome. I just want to get there. Forty years in the wilderness would have done me in.

It is not easy for me to live in the present. I am often seduced into wanting to go back to the way it was or jumping ahead to what is waiting for me. Little did I know how prophetic the words of those were who said to Kim and me, "Enjoy your children because they grow up way too quickly." It is in the space and time of "in between" that we come to know, to love and to trust. It is precisely the place we are called to live.

Northwest Washington is entering "in between" time. In between two bishops. Please welcome Rev. Shelley Bryan Wee. Bishop-elect Shelley and I both are leaning into this in between space knowing that it is sacred encountering space. I encourage you not to look back or to race ahead. Rather welcome this new time and our new Bishop and take up residency in it. It is where we encounter Jesus.

Once Jesus was asked by the Pharisees when the kingdom of God was coming, and he answered, "The kingdom of God is not coming with things that can be observed; nor will they say, 'Look, here it is!' or 'There it is!' For, in fact, the kingdom of God is among you." -- Luke 10:20-21
