In so doing, God has also promised to accompany us, and all people, on our journeys wherever they may lead.

In this election time we are called to be peacemakers, standing firm on compassion. In this election time we are called to remember God even more in our words and deeds to our families, friends, neighbors and enemies.

Jesus says, "but you are not to be called rabbi" because we are God's disciples, working together in God's ministry and central to this ministry of sharing in both Word and deed, the good news found in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. All of you are part of the priesthood of believers, you are God's peace for the people around you.

The Spirit

Dear Ones,

In this month that we celebrate Thanksgiving, I give thanks for you. May God's Spirit continue to lead and guide us in these times.

This last week my mom called to tell me that they would not

be hosting a big family celebration for Thanksgiving this year because of COVID-19. I already knew that we wouldn't be able to have the raucous, crowded party that we have had in the past (and will have in the future), but it still is hard when the decision is voiced.

Unfortunately, we are still in COVID-19 times. And because of this, I want to emphasize a few things for all of you.

In the last few weeks, I have been asked when the synod would have new, updated guidelines. As the guidelines were a few months old, I thought I should review and give new guidelines for where we are now. However, as I started working on updated guidelines, I realized pretty quickly that old guidelines are today's guidelines ... because we are still in COVID -19 times. Therefore, the updated recommendations sound remarkably like the old recommendations.

The NWWA Synod continues to encourage care and thoughtful preparation for your community. A carefilled response is much more than unlocking the church doors and inviting all to come. Please keep in mind the Washington State guidelines and CDC guidelines and the population of your congregation. While we are all in different phases, depending on your county, here are some guidelines that we all should keep in mind.



- 1. Please continue to avoid large gatherings, maintain physical distance when with others, use face coverings, and regularly wash hands and surfaces.
- To maintain ultimate safety, the NWWA Synod continues to recommend that congregations and ministry sites continue to utilize corporate worship on an online or digital platform until February 2021 – and further into 2021 depending on the availability of vaccines or other positive markers.
- If there is an in-person worship experience, please consider meeting outside while masked and physical distanced and following the protocols for a corporate gathering. While this is not completely safe, this is the next safest option to meeting online.
- 4. If there is an in-person worship experience indoors, please understand that there is high -risk involved, and care must be taken for the safety of all. Please consider this carefully and thoroughly before implementing. Please see the synod website for further guidance.
- 5. If you are going to meet in-person, small gatherings are the safest option. Below are some ideas that are meant to meet spiritual, emotional, and physical needs as we continue to navigate this pandemic. (These ideas are meant to be a supplement to online worship and are only to be implemented after careful reflection and planning).
- Small group Bible studies
- One-on-one pastoral care conversations
- Bringing a meal or a card to a homebound person
- Participating in a food drive

Let us thoughtfully and prayerfully prepare. And let us continue to be Holy Community. REFLECTING ON ADVENT

Advent begins on Sunday, November 29 but I would like to propose that Advent started early this year. My church describes the season of Advent as a "time of waiting" so it seems to me that this year Advent must have begun in the middle of March, when we all came to understand what it means to collectively wait. First, we waited two weeks, then two more, then "just until summer" and now ...

Now, we know that waiting is not for the faint of heart. Waiting makes it obvious to us that we are not in control of the future. As the illusion through every possible channel; not the least of which are a deadly virus, the effects of a legacy of racism and inequality, an incomprehensible political landscape fraught with landmines, and massive forest fires consuming swaths of land. With nowhere to run and hide, we have done our best to fight against the fear, to fight FOR the coming future, but despite our best intentions we've been forced to wait. To wait patiently or (more often, in my case) impatiently. Henri Nouwen wrote:

"The word patience means the willingness to stay where we are and live the situation out to the full

in the belief that something hidden there will manifest itself to us."

I can't say much for my own willingness; this has been a time of staying where I am whether I like it or not, but during this unusual and irregular time of advent a few small, hidden things have become manifest to me.

Waiting is active. It's different than "doing" but it's also not passive. Waiting requires

diligence, watchfulness, courage and endurance. SO MUCH ENDURANCE. Waiting involves loss. The last 7 months have been filled with loss. The loss of routine, the loss of stability, the loss of jobs, the loss of homes to wildfires, the loss of people we love.

Waiting is better with rituals. Whether it's the lighting of a candle or a weekly sociallydistanced walk with a friend, rituals become sacred because they bring us into the present moment. And the present moment is where God meets us.

Waiting requires hope. Hoping is different of control has been stripped away fear has entered than wishing in that it involves trust. We trust that greater good is imminent. We trust that God is here, and that God is working through us to create a fuller, deeper and more just world. Waiting changes us. I will spare you the small epiphanies about my own life, but no doubt you've had your own.

> When the actual Advent season begins at the end of November, we will enter it having had a long rehearsal period. We have a fresh perspective on waiting; what it means and what it demands of us.
